



THE NONPROFIT INSTITUTE

The 2020 State of Nonprofits and Philanthropy Annual Report presents findings from six years of quarterly public opinion polling (San Diego Residents Survey) and over 400 survey responses from local nonprofit leaders (Nonprofit Leaders Survey) combined with the latest nonprofit data from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and the California Employment Development Department (EDD). Taken together, these data provide a holistic snapshot of San Diego's nonprofit sector in 2020, summarizing its social and economic contributions to our region, highlighting potential opportunities for greater impact, and drawing our attention to trends which could threaten the nonprofit sector in the future.

This year's report finds the nonprofit sector on the front lines of compounding crises precipitated by the pandemic and its aftermath. Our research shows that the impact of COVID-19 was swift and broadly disruptive. While many nonprofits have seen sharply increasing demand for their services, they have faced exceptional and unique challenges in meeting those demands due to stay at home orders, revenue loss and physical distancing.

The nonprofit sector contributes 9% of our region's total wages and 1 in 10 jobs in the San Diego area. Yet, unlike the Great Recession of a decade ago when nonprofit revenues, staffing and services remained relatively steady, many local nonprofits are faced with

unprecedented cuts to their organizations' finances and staff. This presents a critical challenge for the San Diego region as nonprofit organizations are essential to the recovery of our region's wellbeing and prosperity.

Other key findings include:

- A large majority of nonprofits report loss of fee-for-service revenues and individual donations
- The arts and culture sector has been particularly hard hit by the loss of fee-for-service revenues
- Cash assistance from the federal CARES Act has been vital to continuing the operations of many nonprofit organizations
- Nonprofits are responding to COVID-19 challenges by shifting programs online, working remotely, and collaborating in new ways to leverage community assets

Our quality of life depends on a healthy nonprofit sector. What can San Diegan's do to help? If you are in the position to do so, make sure to financially support your favorite local nonprofits this year.





Negative Impact on Nonprofit Sector Employment and Finances Threatens Capacity to Respond to Community Needs

Despite positive job growth through the end of 2019, there has been a significant and unprecedented hollowing out of the nonprofit workforce. Since March 1, 2020, 47% of nonprofits reported staff furloughs and/ or layoffs, and 26% reported instituting pay cuts.



Nonprofit leaders report decreased revenue across a variety of sources including fee-for-service revenue and individual donations, which on average, equal 95% of all revenues.


San Diegans Express Higher Confidence in Local Nonprofits Versus Corporations and Government








Local Nonprofits Rank Highest at Improving Quality of Life




Local Nonprofits are Viewed as Trustworthy and Effective

Sound the Alarm. Save a Life.

On average, home fires claim seven lives every day, but having working smoke alarms can cut the risk of death by half. The American Red Cross of San Diego and Imperial Counties helps reduce home fire deaths and injuries through its Sound the Alarm. Save a Life. initiative, which is part of the nationwide American Red Cross Home Fire Campaign. Nationwide, 794 lives have been saved through the efforts of the Home Fire Campaign.

Through local Sound the Alarm home fire safety and smoke alarm installation events and appointments, the Red Cross and partners have installed over 29,000 free smoke alarms in San Diego County and provided vital fire safety education and training to residents, helping to make over 10,000 homes safer. In San Diego, five lives have been saved thanks to smoke alarms installed by the Red Cross and our partners.

Blood Donation: Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood-people with cancer, trauma patients, premature babies, accident victims and more. The American Red Cross is the largest single supplier of blood and blood products in the U.S., providing nearly 40% of nation's blood. The need for blood is constant, and volunteer donors are the only source of blood for those in need.

The Red Cross is currently testing all blood, platelet and plasma donations for COVID-19 antibodies. The test may indicate if the donor's immune system has produced antibodies to this coronavirus, regardless of whether they developed symptoms. Red Cross antibody tests will be helpful to identify individuals who have COVID-19 antibodies and may qualify to be convalescent plasma donors.

A gift to support Biomedical Services will help ensure a safe and reliable blood supply is available for patients in need, helping to save lives. Every day the Red Cross hosts hundreds of blood drives to ensure there is enough blood on hospital shelves. San Diego Food Bank Leader Rises to the Occasion



im Floros, president and CEO of the Jacobs & Cushman San Diego Food Bank and North County Food Bank, is no stranger to the nonprofit sector.

After graduating from the University of San Diego with a degree in international relations, Floros, a native Wisconsinite, took an internship position at Project Concern International. The organization, headquartered in San Diego, focuses on driving innovation to enhance health, end hunger and overcome hardship.

While his plan at the time was to start a career in public relations and communications, Floros quickly realized he was skilled at fundraising and fell in love with the idea of making the world a better place through nonprofit work.

Floros worked at PCI for eight years before leaving for The Burn Institute, a local group that empowers burn survivors, as director of development. Eighteen months in, he was offered the CEO position and remained at the post for 20 years before being recruited by the San Diego Food Bank almost eight years ago.

After 36 years in the nonprofit world, Floros has been selected by the San Diego Business Journal for its CEO

of the Year Award in the Nonprofit category. The award program recognizes local industry leaders making notable achievements within their companies and the community.

A Job and a Calling

Today, Floros says, while he appreciates all of his past experiences, working at the San Diego Food Bank is his calling. The organization's mission is to end hunger in the San Diego region and to specifically serve the working poor, children born into and living in poverty, seniors on fixed incomes and active duty military.

As CEO, Floros said he's not only attempting to end hunger, but to address the root cause of hunger in order to break the cycle. The first step is to acknowledge the lack of nutritious food available to low-income communities, which in turn causes health issues and can lead to poor academic performance, thus giving people fewer chances of obtaining a well-paying job in the future.

Alden Domini, corporate and community manager at the Jacobs & Cushman San Diego Food Bank, nominated Floros for the CEO of the Year award. He said, in the past few years, with Floros as the lead, the focus of the organization has shifted from simply "food banking" to comprehensive "nutrition banking" in order to fight nutrition-related diseases.

"The Food Bank has created more programs and services to provide nutrition education programs and fresh, nutritious food to the families it serves," he said. "This is part of the Food Bank's overarching goal to help break the cycle of poverty among its client population."

Fighting the Pandemic

Throughout the coronavirus crisis, the hard work of Floros and the Food Bank has been even more meaningful and impactful. During the first two weeks of the pandemic, the Food Bank pushed out 700,000 pounds of food to its network of 500 nonprofits; it hosted four mass distributions; and created and continues to run 35 super pantries, or high-volume distribution sites. To help support the 35 super pantries, the San Diego Food Bank awarded each of them \$20,000 to buy refrigeration, pallets and storage, among other necessities, all made possible by generous San Diego donors.

As a result, since COVID-19, the San Diego Food Bank has distributed over 30 million pounds of food, enough to fill a thousand semi-trucks. While it spends around \$1 million in food purchases a year, the organization has spent \$8 million since mid-March to address the needs of the growing number of food insecure during this time. These days, it is feeding nearly 600,000 people a month, up from 350,000 per month.

The Jacobs & Cushman San Diego Food Bank, founded in 1977, has about 75 employees and counted on roughly 32,000 volunteers last year between its two locations. Its annual operating budget is \$13 million, \$85 million total including the monetary value of food supply.

In His Own Words:

"This is a 'we' award as we have assembled an outstanding team of staff with an incredible organizational culture. There is only one name on the award, but, so many people's names should be on this. I marvel at how quickly we pivoted and adapted and overcame, but I also know this is in our DNA. In leading our organization through the crisis, I realized we have built a ship to weather the storm. We've worked so hard to create organizational excellence, strong relationships with donors, the media, government officials and top-notch financials, that we've created this crazy great culture among the staff and volunteers. This is the stuff you do because you are supposed to do it. We built this ship and this ship is serving us so well."












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Philanthropists, Service Agencies Have a Year Like No Other

Coronavirus Pandemic Continues to Shape 2020

t has been a notable year for philanthropy. Like a tennis star on her toes, waiting to see how her opponent planned to return the ball, philanthropists waited to see where and how COVID-19 affected the community, and then rushed to the spot to help as they could. Individuals and businesses gave money and other things of value. Nonprofits pivoted, adjusting their services as the unique rhythm of 2020 became apparent.

The San Diego Business Journal documented this unusual spring, which rolled over into summer and fall. What follows is an abbreviated recap.

Millions Raised and Granted

As of mid-October, the San Diego Foundation had raised and granted more than \$50 million for COVID-19 relief. A special fund — the San Diego COVID-19 Community Response Fund — has helped tens of thousands of residents ranging from seniors to preschoolers, giving them relief from the pandemic's economic and social impacts. More than 3,300 individuals, businesses and funds contributed to the effort as of mid-October.

In July, the foundation was responsible for an \$11.4 million wave of grants, largely funded by the city and county of San Diego. Top recipients were the YMCA of San Diego County and Child Development Associates Inc. The bulk of these rapid response grants went toward childcare support for frontline and healthcare workers as well as low-income families.

Also receiving grants during the July cycle: the Central San Diego Black Chamber of Commerce received \$100,000 for financial assistance to B lack-owneds mall businesses and their employees; the San Diego LGBT Community Center received \$24,000 for crisis counseling and support as well as basic services such as food, housing and healthcare; and the San Diego Hunger Coalition received \$225,000 to expand food distribution systems and increase the number of meals provided throughout the county.

The support effort continues. In October, the foundation made \$1.5 million in loans to San Diego County nonprofits confronting COVID-19.

Worker Assistance

In March, **United Way of San Diego County** launched its San Diego Worker Assistance Initiative as part of the greater San Diego COVID-19 Community Response Fund. Its aim is to provide resources to people impacted by layoffs and reduced working hours. The ultimate goal is to prevent the need to enter the social services system of care and prevent homelessness.

Within two weeks of launching the Initiative, the local United Way received more than 8,400 applications. As of October, the initiative had provided more than \$750,000 in direct assistance through utilities and rent/mortgage payments. The program is expected to help more than 7,500 San Diegans.

Among those providing support to the program are the San Diego & Imperial Counties Labor Council, the San Diego Foundation and the county government.

Separately, the hospitality community raised funds to help laid-off restaurant workers as well as workers whose families had been affected by COVID-19.

Filling Needs

As 2020 developed, a group of relief organizations provided food for the hungry (see related story) as well as shelter for the homeless and resources for the jobless.

In the spring, Jewish Family Service of San Diego adapted its programs to the times. That included its Safe Parking Program where people living in their cars were able to camp in designated parking lots. The program has provided handwashing stations, restrooms and access to showers. The Kearny Mesa organization also kept other programs going, such as drive-through food distribution events.

The YMCA of San Diego County voluntarily shut down its facilities in March. Behind the scenes, however, work continued. In addition to its efforts connecting people with childcare, the

organization offered essential services to homeless youth and families, and continued mental health counseling services using telecommunications technology. Shuttered branches across San Diego County became venues for American Red Cross blood drives.

Over the summer, the YMCA was able to provide day camp programs to families in need, thanks to benefactors. Even with the reopening of many YMCAs, the organization continues to provide free virtual programs for the community, including live and on-demand exercise classes.

Addressing Health Concerns

TrueCare, the nonprofit formerly known as North County Health Services, reported a brisk business this year. The organization works to ensure everyone receives healthcare — particularly low-income families impacted during COVID-19, suffering job losses and loss of insurance.

TrueCare is conducting COVID-19 testing, virtual health visits, primary care, specialty care and connection to community services such as food banks. It also helps people navigate the difficult waters of insurance enrollment, guiding anyone in the community to find the best healthcare insurance options to stay covered or get covered during this time.

Since January, TrueCare has conducted more than 77,000 virtual health visits. Many of the patients lacked the ability to pay for their care. In the same period, TrueCare saw new Medi-Cal enrollments increase more than 15% to 2,185 individuals. New food assistance enrollments under the CalFresh program grew 124% to 713 individuals.

Coming Together

An enduring memory of the spring of 2020 is how quickly and forcefully community organizations came together to confront the societal challenge of COVID-19.

With shortages of personal protective equipment, businesses by the dozen created facemasks and face shields. **HP Inc.** put its 3-D printers to work on the task. "I think we have an obligation to help if there is a critical need in our community

for personal protective equipment," said **Mariya Gelman**, R&D manager for 3-D printing at HP. A few companies — notably **ResMed** — ramped up production of ventilators.

Of course, businesses can, and did, give.

Estancia La Jolla Hotel & Spa, along with other members of the local hospitality community, launched a "Buy One, Give One" program. With every future \$500 travel voucher bought from the hotel, Estancia said it would give one complimentary room night to UC San Diego Heath, as well as gift cards or loyalty points, as a thank-you to a local health care worker.

Similarly, Rancho Bernardo Inn said with every spa and resort gift card purchased at \$25 or more, it donated room nights equivalent to the total value of gift cards purchased.

Businesses also treated hospital staffs and medical personnel to meals. In one example from May, volunteers from California Coast Credit Union, with support from the San Diego Gulls and Rockin' Baja Lobster in Old Town, delivered lunch to frontline staff at the VA San Diego Clinic in Mission Valley.

Gathering and Distancing

2020 was also the year that fund-raising events — and other gatherings — changed.

With restrictions imposed on group meetings, fundraising events went virtual. In early May, that phenomenon was new and unusual. Under the headline "Innovative Times," the San Diego Business Journal noted the fact that the local **Susan G. Komen** breast cancer relief organization shifted its More Than Pink annual dinner to a virtual event.

In the spring, as colleges and universities across California suspended in-person classes. San Diego-based **National University** offered three months of free online classes to California college students.

With the pandemic, San Diegans came together. But the crisis is not yet over. The organizations within this guide have committed to help some more. Robust community support in the form of volunteerism and monetary donations can help them better achieve their objectives — perhaps even reach goals that seem like a stretch.

OVID-19 has caused turmoil in virtually every aspect of society and brought to the forefront the social imbalances that nonprofits have been fighting for years. As the local crisis stretches into its eighth month, San Diego nonprofits and the people they serve are in the battle of their lives, as hunger and the risk of homelessness grow to levels never seen before.

The **San Diego Business Journal** reached out to six notable area nonprofits that tackle homelessness, feed the hungry and serve families in crisis. We were primarily interested in the topic of putting food on the table or in the pantry.

Participating nonprofits included:

- Father Joe's Villages, a homeless services provider in downtown San Diego celebrating 70 years. The organization meets basic needs by providing meals, showers, housing, medical and dental care. Other services include vocational training.
- Feeding San Diego, an organization whose mission is to connect every person facing hunger with nutritious meals by maximizing food rescue. It is one of the newest hunger-relief organizations in the Feeding America network.
- **Interfaith Community Services,** an organization that has been helping people help themselves since 1979. Its five areas of emphasis are supportive services; housing; clinical and behavioral health; recovery and wellness; and employment and economic development.
- The Jacobs & Cushman San Diego Food Bank, a hunger-relief organization which distributed 28 million pounds of food in 2019. Working in tandem with the North County Food Bank, it advocates for the hungry and educates the public about hunger-related
- The Salvation Army, an international movement with a longtime presence in California. Its human services and poverty relief efforts reach far beyond COVID-19. The organization assists 23 million Americans every year.
- **South Bay Community Services,** an organization that provides supportive services to children, youth and families via more than 50 programs. Founded as a center for drug abusing teens, the nonprofit now touches the lives of 50,000 people yearly.

The following is a collection of their responses to five questions.

How did you and your team respond when the COVID-19 crisis initially began?

"We wanted to make sure people could feed their families," said **Lt. Col. Lee Lescano**, divisional secretary for **The Salvation Army's** San Diego office. The organization scheduled food distributions at its seven community centers all over the county. They are still ongoing, Lescano noted.

"At the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, we knew that people on the streets relied on our Franklin Antonio Public Lunch program for critical nutrition every day," said Deacon Jim Vargas, president and CEO of Father Joe's Villages. "We had to find a way to safely continue providing meals. Immediately, we closed our dining rooms and transitioned all of our meal programs to offer packaged, to go meals so that neighbors could packaged, to-go meals so that neighbors could enjoy their food with physical distancing in an outdoor setting.

"We saw a 427% increase in the number of families turning to Interfaith Community Services in need of emergency food support," said Greg Anglea, CEO of Interfaith Community Services.

"Our frontline social workers met that need and connected people in crisis to our deeper dive, 'helping people help themselves' self-sufficiency services."

As an essential service, Feeding San Diego immediately stepped up to meet the rise in need for food assistance by creating emergency food distributions across San Diego County, while also expanding existing distributions in specific regions. The organization pivoted very quickly to new methods of food distribution, implementing drive-through distributions to ensure social distancing. It also critically assessed the gaps in food assistance because of closures of schools, businesses and partner sites, and sprang into action to address the need based on those criteria. need based on those criteria.

South Bay Community Services said that at the beginning of the crisis, it leveraged all possible resources and partnerships to swiftly and comprehensively meet the essential food and shelter needs of the communities it serves. It also worked to ensure the continuity of education, mental health and violence prevention support (modified as required) through its array of longstanding programs.

At the start of the COVID crisis, the San **Diego Food Bank** quickly mobilized to meet the skyrocketing demand for food assistance from families affected by job loss. In the first two weeks after the state of emergency was declared, the Food Bank conducted 175 food distributions and passed out nearly 600,000 more pounds of food to seniors and families in need. Since mid-March, the Food Bank has distributed 32 million pounds of food through its COVID-19 Response Programs.

What is the biggest challenge you faced due to the crisis?

'In the beginning we ran out of food guickly because the need was so great," said The Salvation Army's Lescano. "We gave away 500 food boxes in an hour in the East County."

"COVID-19 presented a perfect storm of increased demand, declines in donations of food, and disruptions to our operating model," said Dan Shea, interim CEO of Feeding San Diego.

The pandemic has also increased Feeding San Diego's reliance on purchased food due to disruptions in the supply chain and the increased need for food assistance. "Normally, we purchase approximately 24 truckloads of food in an entire year. However, over the past six months (beginning in April 2020) we have purchased over 150

truckloads of food to supplement donated food." The organization is committed to maximizing food The organization is committed to maximizing food rescue, but with supply chains completely upended by the pandemic, it had to restructure operations to make sure it could meet the need. "We also saw need in places that we had never seen before," Shea said, "so it was a challenge to make sure we could reach every hard-hit area and get the word out so the communities knew we were there for them."

Kathie Lembo, president and CEO of South Bay Community Services, said the crisis demanded an energetic response. "It took all hands on deck and a flexible and dedicated collective effort on the part of our team of more than 400 to pivot to virtual service delivery and scale up essential supports for families," she said. "But together with our many phenomenal community partners we made it

Interfaith Community Services found itself shorthanded. The nonprofit relies on thousands of volunteers working alongside a professional staff numbering more than 200, all to help more than 20,000 people annually. "When COVID began, 90% of our volunteers were forced to stay home, stretching out remaining volunteers and staff very thin," said Anglea, "all amidst a surge in need for our services and challenges inherent to provide essential, in-person help with food, shelter, crisis counseling and treatment."

For the San Diego Food Bank, the biggest challenge faced since the crisis started was recruiting volunteers to work at its San Diego and North County warehouses. The organization relies on 25,000 volunteers every year. After a public call for help, the community stepped up and thousands of individuals and families have volunteered to help the Food Bank continue its vital hunger-relief

Father Joe's Villages found itself looking beyond its home turf at 15th Street and Imperial Avenue. "Early on, as restaurants and other food programs closed, we heard reports of increased hunger and desperation in neighborhoods outside of East Village," said Vargas. "We had to address the logistical challenges of providing meals in other neighborhoods where there were people experiencing homelessness who may not have access to transportation to come to the Franklin Antonio Public Lunch program every day.

Lescano said a longstanding tradition for his organization will change because of the pandemic. The **Salvation Army** will not be able to serve sitdown holiday meals at Golden Hall, in the San Diego City Hall complex, like it has done for more than 50 years. "We will still have the meals available. We just had to change the way they will be distributed," he said.

Have you experienced an increase in demand for your services during the pandemic? If so, how much compared to last year?

The Salvation Army's Lescano said the need for his services is more than triple that of last year. Anglea of Interfaith Community Services noted a 427% increase.

Lembo said **South Bay Community Services'** distributions of fresh and nonperishable healthy food for families are now serving an average of 4,000 to 5,000 individuals per week — more than 10 times the volume served prior to COVID-19. "We have seen similar increases in need for support services including housing assistance and domestic violence response," she said

Feeding San Diego's Shea recalled that before the COVID-19 pandemic, one in eight people in San Diego County faced hunger, including one in six children. Now, the need has surged by 50%. Between July 1, 2019 and June 30, 2020, the organization served more than 31.2 million meals, which was nearly 20% more meals than the year prior.

Many organizations offer more than food. In conjunction with the city, county and housing commission, **Father Joe's Villages** created additional shelter beds at the San Diego Convention Center. "Where we have seen an increased need is amongst those who are still on the streets and harder to reach," said Vargas. "As a result of this need, we have already served 10,000 meals at our new satellite locations in Hillcrest and downtown San Diego, in addition to the hundreds of meals we serve each day through our Food Services program."

Before the COVID-19 pandemic impacted the community, the San Diego Food Bank provided food assistance to 350,000 people per month — about 11% of the county's population. Since mid-March, when the county declared a state of emergency, the Food Bank is now feeding an estimated 600,000 people per month due soaring unemployment and COVID-19's devastating impact on the local economy.

What new programs or services has your organization created?

In order to meet the increased demand for food assistance — and to serve clients more quickly, safely and efficiently — the San Diego Food Bank launched its Super Pantry program. Starting in July, 35 Super Pantries, strategically located throughout the county, have been operating as high volume distribution hubs, open a minimum of three days per week. The 35 Super Pantries are projected to distribute 1.2 million pounds of food to 130,000 people in need every month.

Interfaith Community Services was selected as a Super Pantry site. Anglea, the CEO of Interfaith, said the new level of partnership helped to enhance Interfaith's drive-through and walk-up services, allowing it to more efficiently serve the influx of individuals and families seeking nutritional support each week.

Interfaith Community Services also launched three popup hotel shelters for older adults and people with health conditions who need to shelter in place but are homeless. "We expanded our overnight Haven House homeless shelter to operate 24/7," Anglea said. "We mobilized our Senior Services to reach homebound, sheltering-in-place seniors. We have quadrupled our rental assistance programs. In October 2020 we purchased a 77-room motel to provide Graduate Lodging and expand our Recuperative Care for individuals being discharged from local hospitals. We are expanding vocational training programs, and helping individuals who have lost employment to obtain new jobs and move into new careers."

Feeding San Diego added a Food Finder map to its website. "Thousands of people are facing hunger, many for the first time," Shea said. "This new map helps those in need of food assistance find food distributions close to them."

The Salvation Army is delivering food to seniors every day. "We had an ongoing senior nutrition program at several of our locations where the seniors could gather to eat. Now for their safety, we are taking the food to their homes," said Lescano.

In addition, The Salvation Army created a 'grab and go' lunch program for children who are not able to get meals at school.

"We have applied for and gotten funding to help people with rental and utility assistance," Lescano added.

As a result of increased need in the community, **Father Joe's Villages** expanded its lunch program to two additional locations in Hillcrest and downtown San Diego. Its outreach team also began bringing packaged meals with them into the community. Moreover, to support increased sustenance and nutrition among those living on the streets, it expanded its Franklin Antonio Public Lunch program to serve breakfast and dinner as well.

South Bay Community Services scaled up distributions of food and essential supplies such as diapers. With schools closed, it saw one more need. The organization activated socially distanced, health- and safety-compliant learning pods. These ensure families — who would otherwise struggle with participation in distance learning — are connected, equipped and supported to get the most out

of the virtual format local schools have transitioned to. Staff is trained on distance learning platforms and are supporting all aspects of remote schooling that students need to stay on track.

In closing, what would you like San Diego Business Journal readers to know?

"Interfaith Community Services is working 24/7 with people facing financial crisis due to COVID-19," said Anglea. "These individuals are disproportionately people of color. Our programs and services are helping, but we need community support to continue meeting greater needs. Please consider gifts of time, talent and treasure to help during this time of crisis." "To say the last few months have been challenging would be an understatement," said James Floros, president and CEO of the Jacobs & Cushman San Diego Food Bank. "No one could have seen the COVID-19 crisis coming, and we could not imagine the devastation it would cause, but the community should know that the San Diego Food Bank and our North County Food Bank chapter have built a ship to weather the storm. We are the right organization at the right time. We are doing what we always do — pivot, adapt and respond. Our high level of organizational excellence has served — and will continue to serve — our community well. Your local food bank is leading our hunger-relief community. Feeding San Diego was founded in the wake of the 2007 wildfires, so emergency response is in its DNA, Shea said. "However, COVID-19 has brought significant challenges due to the breadth and scale of the disaster. Partnerships have always been critical to Feeding San Diego — in fact we can't fulfill our mission without them — however, they take on heightened importance as we work to overcome the challenges COVID-19 has created. Families facing hunger are in crisis. Thousands of San Diegans who are food insecure are having to make difficult choices about whether to buy groceries, or forgo them in order to pay rent, utilities, transportation costs or medical bills. Now, more than ever, children, families and seniors are depending on our community to come together so they have access to adequate meals." Visit feedingsandiego.org for additional information.

"A meal is more than just a full stomach," said Vargas, who leads Father Joe's Villages. "Food provides the energy neighbors need to overcome obstacles to housing and employment. As one of our program graduates, Eddie, said, 'Hunger brings weakness and sickness. It's hard to help yourself or work for a better life when all you can think about is how hungry you are.' A meal is also an opportunity to connect with resources that can help a person leave homelessness behind." Visit my.neighbor.org for more information.

Philanthropy is Evolving



and so are we

hen the history books are written, it may be tempting to write 2020 off as the worst of the worst. And that may not be entirely incorrect: we've seen unemployment rates in our region reach new highs, racial injustices and deeply fractured social systems laid bare, and a housing crisis accelerated by the compounding effects of a global pandemic and plummeted economy. But through this onslaught of challenges, we've also borne witness to a renewed mindset for those working to serve our communities: one of tenacious resiliency, creative ingenuity and a firm belief that we are stronger together.

WE'VE SEEN FUNDERS OF ALL KINDS RALLY-**ING TOWARD A COMMON CAUSE:** To ensure support reached Black-owned small businesses and entrepreneurs hit hardest by the economic fallout of COVID-19, the Central San Diego Black Chamber of Commerce joined with the San Diego Padres and San Diego Grantmakers (SDG), along with 40 businesses, hundreds of citizens, The San Diego Business Journal, The San Diego Union Tribune, and the City of San Diego to raise \$1 million in just 60 days. Together, we turned that into hundreds of grants to small businesses.

WE'VE SEEN INGENUITY BROUGHT **TO ACTION:** Yes in God's Backyard (YIGBY), a project hosted by SDG, is an initiative with a mission to build affordable housing on land owned by churches and faith-based organizations. The YIGBY working group, which includes business leaders, architects, planners and funders, developed a financial model that is 100 percent private funding and is currently partnered with Bethel AME Church to develop a demonstration project of 16 housing units for veterans experiencing homelessness.

WE'VE SEEN A DESIRE TO GO FURTHER TO-**GETHER:** Whether you have \$5,000 to give or \$5 million, working with others to learn about an issue and take action strengthens your impact. We've seen this through collaborative funding groups that we convene for our region, including groups focused on ending homelessness; addressing our food system; advocating for immigrant rights; ensuring success in early childhood; and inspiring the next generation of trailblazers in STEAM education. One example: the San Diego Food Funders collaborative worked with Coastal Roots Farm and the Tribal Justice Initiative to provide fresh produce to families and elders in partnership with the lipay Nation of Santa Ysabel and San Diego American Indian Health Center when the pandemic restricted their food access.

WE'VE SEEN FUNDING (AND FUNDERS) OF ALL **TYPES MEET THE MOMENT:** The who and how of giving in our region, and nationwide, is shifting. The types of funding have broadened and include investments that earn social and financial returns, zero interest loans, technical assistance, and unrestricted general support. Funders have grown beyond individuals, anchor institutions, corporations and donor-advised fund holders and now include increasingly active funding in informal ways such as giving circles, crowdfunding and direct individual support.

The collaboration mus cle our region has spent decades building is flexing, and not a moment too soon.

At San Diego Grantmakers, a network of more than 150 organizations and individuals seeking to improve social outcomes for our



region, we have witnessed the changes in philanthropy firsthand as our organization has grown and evolved right along with it. 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What does equitable distance learning look like? The San Diego Foundation Growing a Vibrant Region

The COVID-19 pandemic thrust students, parents and teachers into remote learning environments, elevating racial and socioeconomic inequities that have been brewing in San Diego communities for years.

Many students are forced to work in crowded apartments or small homes with limited access to computers and the internet. Others lack access to the face-to-face tutoring and handson support they need to succeed in the classroom. All the while they struggle to find conducive schoolwork environments at home, they worry about their parents and grandparents being exposed to the coronavirus.

A recent study from the University of Southern California on Connected Communities and Inclusive Growth shows North County and coastal communities have the highest percentage of households with access to computers and broadband internet, while the southern parts of San Diego County and rural areas have the lowest percentage of households with access.

Students are resilient, but learning barriers are compounded by regional trends in unemployment and COVID-19 cases, which have disproportionately impacted Black, Latinx and tribal communities, and constrained income as measured by free and reduced-priced meals at school (FRPM).

The digital divide is clear.

And while providing computers and internet connectivity is an important component to bridging the digital divide during COVID-19, it's not enough.

For distance learning to be equitable, three things must happen - teachers must have training; parents and caregivers must have resources; and students must have supportive learning environments. That's according to the San Diego Equitable Distance Learning Taskforce, which is co-chaired by COVID-19 Community Response Fund grantee Classroom of the Future Foundation and San Diego for Every Child, in conjunction with the San Diego County Office of Education and a broad coalition of community stakeholders.

The taskforce's Beyond the Hotspot: Supporting Equitable Distance Learning in San Diego County report says that technological devices and sufficient connectivity are a necessary educational investment, but not enough to promote equity in learning



Closing the opportunity gaps in learning will require developing an infrastructure that provides all stakeholders with the support necessary.

The report states: "This is a critical and shared responsibility that includes, but is not limited to, parents and caregivers, educators, community organizations, out-of-school providers, and employers. We must ensure educators have the training they need, parents and caregivers are supported and students have a safe place to learn."

In addition to supporting digital connectivity, the report indicates that empowering parents to support their children's academic progress is crucial during remote learning. It requires consistent, culturally, and linguistically appropriate communication and shared understanding of the expectations for children and for families. It also emphasizes the need to support community-based organizations and out-of-school time providers that have expertise in developing responsive programming, working with families and leveraging those relationships to target support where it's needed most.

Furthermore, supporters need to help cultivate student motivation and deepen engagement during remote learning. During remote learning, students are navigating a monthslong stint of isolation, uncertainty, and disruption to their learning and social routines. These factors can increase risk for poor mental health outcomes, according to the report.



Without a holistic approach to providing equitable distance learning during the pandemic, learning loss will unavoidable. And it will likely be greatest among Black and Latinx students, as well as students from lower-income households.

A recent McKinsey & Company report outlines that while the average learning loss during the COVID-19 distance learning environment is seven months, Black students may fall behind 10.3 months, Latinx students by 9.2 months, and students in lower-income households by more than a year. If left unaddressed, this could lead to an increase in dropout rates and a decrease in the local talent pool.

In recent years, government, business and philanthropy have strengthened efforts to build an inclusive workforce so that San Diego's innovation economy remains competitive. However, COVID-19 threatens that progress.

The San Diego Regional Economic Development Corporation reminds us that every recovery that the American economy has experienced in history, from the years following the Great Depression to those following the Great Recession, has increased systemic poverty and widened racial inequities.

Now, more than ever, equity is paramount to helping every community thrive and growing the regional economy.

As leaders from every sector prioritize COVID-19 relief and recovery, San Diegans have an opportunity to bridge economic, educational and racial gaps in new, impactful and meaningful ways that strengthen regional resilience.

Since the emergence of the crisis, the San Diego COVID-19 Community Response Fund at The San Diego Foundation has rapidly deployed resources on a rolling basis to nonprofit organizations that are supporting low-income workers, families and vulnerable communities most affected by the coronavirus

Given the critical role education plays in our recovery from the COVID-19 crisis, the wellbeing of our young people and the prosperity of our region, The San Diego Foundation is now focusing investments from the COVID-19 Community Response Fund on education-related impacts and community response efforts that:

- Prioritize children and youth most adversely impacted by learning loss and the digital divide
- Ensure families, homes, schools, and communities are able to support successful starts and transitions in educational pathways
- Activate creative collaboration and our region's environmental assets as sources of learning and development for students

Since March, the COVID-19 Community Response Fund has granted more than \$50 million out into the community to address the impacts of the pandemic, but that amount is only a fraction of the total unmet needs in San Diego County that continue to grow. As families settle into virtual learning environments and students face new challenges with their education and development, the COVID-19 Community Response Fund will raise money and prioritize the needs of our youngest San Diegans. 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


